March Portrait Competition By: Christine Wilkins and Wayne Staley

The second competition of 2012 will be held on March 20, the third Tuesday of the month. The theme is Portraits and all entries must be Print following the LPA print rules which follow.

- 1. Prints must have one minimum dimension (length or width) of at least 9".
- Maximum mount board size in Novice, Amateur, and Advanced categories is 16" x 20" and 17" x 24" in the



Master category. Panoramic prints may be up to 320 square inches in area in Novice, Amateur, and Advanced categories and up to 408 square inches in the Master category.

- 3. Prints must be mounted. Foam core is recommended, but mount board will be accepted. Borders on mount boards are acceptable.
- 4. Mats and frames are NOT accepted.
- 5. The back of each print will have the photographer's name and the title of the picture. Each slide will be identified by title and photographer's name on the mount, no stickers. Slides must have a dot on the lower left corner of the mount when viewed properly.
- 6. An image that has won 1st, 2nd or 3rd in any past LPA competition may not be re-entered. HM's may be re-entered. New work is encouraged.
 - A. All entries will be judged at the level in which they are entered. The issuing of ribbons will be left to the discretion of the judge. Ribbons will not be given if the judge does not feel the entry is deserving of an award. Ribbons will be awarded for 1st, 2nd, 3rd and HM's, and the decisions of the judges will be final. Judges will be selected by the Chairperson.
 - B. When a competitor wins two first place ribbons in a given level since they started competing at LPA,



they will be moved to the next higher level for the next competition year. For this purpose, only regular LPA competitions are considered. Blue ribbons won in other competitions, including the LPA's "Year End" competition and the AV Fair, do not count. Moving up to next level is "Mandatory" only once a year. You can choose to move up to the next level at anytime with the concurrence of the Competition Chairperson.

Larry Cowles is the judge for this competition. Larry

has been a member of PSA since 1984. His interest in photography started when he was in high school but really started to develop while he was in the military, learning to process black & white images in the base darkroom. Working in the film processing industry for ten years gave him the skills to teach photography and after winning a company photo contest, he was hooked on entering state fairs and local camera store contests and later exhibitions.

Being involved in a local camera club lead him to join PSA. Over the years Larry has held many offices in camera clubs, local councils, and PSA. Travel, teaching photography, judging, lecturing, presenting photography programs, and writing for the PSA Journal and other publications has helped Larry to develop his photographic skills and his ability to compete worldwide in photography exhibitions. He has been the Chair of several exhibitions and actively involved in PSA as a member of several committees, Director of the Color Projected Image Division (CPID) Tops, Chair of CPID, and Editor of the CPID News for the PSA Journal.



"photo studio" set up for us to practice with lighting setups, posing models and working with our settings on our cameras in various modes.

Douglas and Glenn set up studios with constant lighting in which the fluorescent lights were on continuously. Douglas had a photo backdrop constructed out of PVC and fabric. Glenn had a Chromakey/ Green Screen set up.

Notes From Lyle

Critique: "a critical estimate or discussion"



Wow! There is Great Impact in both images, good Composition, Sharp Details, good Exposure, and I assume you are trying to present a somewhat "Creative Color" image. If so, you succeeded. I love the patch of blue sky, and the blue and gold water

in the Merced River is a touch of fine artistry in the El Capitan photo. The subjects are favorites of generations of photographers, and it's hard to create an image that is different from a hundred others taken that same day, but you've taken a bold step with these images! Regrettably, the "blocked up" tree line in the El Capitan image, and the

"blocked up" rock and horizon in the Death Valley photo detract from your images. Silhouettes are rarely effective when they are seen as a central part of the subject that should help to tell the story. Both pictures suffer from an old problem; The gamut (range) of the digital sensors common today are slightly better than the "chromes" ever were, by about one half to one f-stop, but still there, limiting your choices when it comes to nailing down exposures.



When everyone was shooting chromes (Kodachrome, Ektachrome, Fujichrome, etc.) the gamut was so narrow you had to be within half an f-stop (max) to get a decent exposure. Every time someone shot a sunset they either got a "blocked up" foreground silhouette and a beautiful sky, or a good foreground exposure and a "washed out" sky. The results were less than satisfactory in both cases. So, the Graduated Neutral Density (GND) filter became popular. One could position the filter transition zone on the horizon, hold back the sky by one to three f-stops, and get a very good sunset exposure with a tack sharp foreground -- and a beautiful sky, (the sky being the subject).

Here's what I recommend: (If you don't already know) Learn how to use the HD mode on your camera. Generally, you can use it for 2, 3, 5 or 7 exposure H D images, then process them in Photoshop, Lightroom, or Topaz Suite, and print out, or file images for projection that knock your eye out. To get the best possible landscape images one must use a sturdy tripod, a remote shutter release, perhaps a retracted mirror, (depends on your camera model) and a "blacked out" viewfinder. Peak up your camera settings for the largest, most colorful, sharpest image you can make, shoot RAW and JPEG, and even TIFs to see the benefits you get from each. If you get "very" good you will be able to print awesome 30 X 40 Prints.

Speaking of 30 X 40 prints; If you have never been there, stop in at Galen Rowell's Mountain Light Gallery in the old Bishop Bank Building, at the corner of Line and Main in Bishop, CA. I do, whenever I go through the area. It's like going back to my roots. Sometimes I buy a book, or a picture, in memory of Galen and Barbara Rowell, and recall the great influence they had on my photography. I still carry a set of 4 GND filters I bought from Galen Rowel, and probably should relegate them to the shoe box on the top shelf, because I haven't used them for years. But every time I think of taking them out of my camera case I'm reminded of the days when they were the jewels that elevated me from taking snapshots, and allowed me to make attention getting, bright, colorful, imaginative images that won the hearts and minds of my peers. We all learned together then, and ushered in the digital revolution.

studios. Each had four separate flash units for his main, fill, hair and background lights. Each of these studios also had marbled backdrops. Bonnie/Dwight had a marbled backdrop and Kurtiss had a gray backdrop but used a purple filter over the backdrop light to change the color. Bonnie assisted Canon photographers and Dwight the Nikon photographers in setting their custom white balance by using a "black, grey, and white digital calibration target" to set the correct exposure. Bonnie believes as she was taught in her very first LPA workshop with Hank Morris, by using these steps in her workflow it drastically reduce her workflow on the back-end by getting it right on the front-end. You can achieve perfect exposures and white balance every time. Both Bonnie and Kurtiss allowed the photographers to use their remote flash triggers, Pocket Wizards and gave proper instructions on their use. These attached to the camera's flash shoe and triggered the flash lighting via a radio signal when the camera shutter was opened. Bonnie also worked with the members to give ideas on how to pose the models.

All models volunteered their time for the workshop. They had varying levels of modeling

The Benefits of HDR, It can be a Love Hate Relationship By Helen Henry

Do you love HDR? Do you hate HDR? It seems to be the question many people are asking these days. Did you know that our eyes see in approximately 11 stops of light? Our cameras can only reproduce around 6. That is a difference of 5 stops of light. That can make a huge difference in the outcome of a photo. So, this explains



why when you see an image out of your camera you say, "That does not look like I remember". Now, with HDR technology we can reproduce the actual full High Dynamic Range of a scene to actually match what our eyes have seen. One of the best things about HDR is you can make fantastic images from shots taken almost any time of day. If your eye can see it, you can usually make your camera, with a little help from your computer, reproduce it.

So, how do you do this? As in many cases in photography this depends on a few things. One of your main goals is to get as much information in the images you are going to use in as few shots as possible. You will need to evaluate what the scene you wish to take is offering. Remember, the fewer images you use to produce your HDR image will mean less noise in the finale image. While you are taking the images take a few more, with wider exposure range. This will help when evaluating which ones to use to create the finale image. To help figure out what to set your exposure range at we need

to look at the light. This means what is the light doing? How much contrast is there? The shots you take to create your HDR image will need to capture information in the shadows as will as the highlighted parts of your image. Things that move will create blur, so use a tripod and try setting your camera at least 1/125th. Let's start with a three shot image. Take one image that is at the recommended exposure from your camera, than one at +2 EV and then one at -2 EV. Refer to your manual how to set up

bracketing. By using this feature in your camera your images can be taken fast, helping to eliminate any blur that might occur. Boats moving up and down in the water will cause blur in your image even if you are using a tripod. So be aware of things in the image itself, not just you or your



camera, which could possibly move and set your shutter to stop any motion. This could be small movement but your camera will pick it up. You would probably be disappointed if you came home from a day of shooting boats bobbing in the water and have them be blurred after you process them. Using a cable release also will help stop any camera movement.

HDR 2 of 3

Your aperture needs to remain constant with all the images you plan for your HDR image. By using aperture priority or manual you can set your camera at one aperture and it will stay that way until you change it again. Your focus point also needs to remain unchanged. One of the easier ways to do this is to use your auto focus feature to focus the scene, and then be very careful not to move your camera, turn it off. Some cameras have live view, using this could help with movement as well as composition. This way the focus point will remain constant. By using a low ISO setting the digital noise will also be kept to a minimum. The digital noise will really show in the dark areas and areas that have nothing in them such as the sky.

If the images in a sequence are hard to tell apart try taking a picture of something such as your hand to show you where you began and ended. This

trick can also be used when taking panoramas. Basics are very important, keep them in mind. Be careful and be aware of your surroundings. Now for the fun part! Seeing what you can create out of your shots. There are quite a few software programs that can be used to merge your images. Photomatix and Nik HDR Efex Pro are 2 you might want to try. They both have a free download version. If you are a PSA member you are entitled to a 15% Discount on new products & upgrades with Nik.

Rick Sammon has a HDR app that can be downloaded for additional information. At least two of the winning images in the <u>POM</u> for October are HDR images. Check them out!

Remember, make images just don't take pictures. Express the artist you are.

Image HDR 1 of 3 was shot at 5.0 sec at f/16 ISO 10028mm (EF28-300mmf/3.5-5.6IS USM).

Image HDR 2 of 3 was shot at 2.5 sec, the rest of the settings remained the same.

Image HDR 3 of 3 was shot at 0.8 sec, the rest of the settings remained the same.

Image Finished_HDR.tif is a 3 image HDR shot, combined with HDR Pro with only some sharpening applied.

Death Valley Field Trip February 10-12, 2012 by Douglas Wade

Death Valley National Park is a desert wonderland of immense scale, beauty and power. It's 3.3 million acres, and the vast majority of which are road-less wilderness. The park encompasses a staggering array of landscapes, unique geologic formations, and colorful vistas. As largest National Park in the contiguous United States. Death Valley is both beautiful to behold and rich in history, mood and mystique. Its towering sand dunes, seasonally snow-capped mountains, warm springs, and vast empty valleys offer endless opportunity for exploration and ample subject matter for the creative artist. There's no place on earth quite like it.

The Death Valley field trip consisted of the following photographers: Douglas Webber, Bruce and Diane Cable, Inga Nagel, Mike Scheall and myself, Douglas Wade.

I arrived one day earlier to work my way out to the Racetrack and Ubehebe Crater (pronounced you-be-hebe). The group arrived safely at the meeting time of 2:00PM on Friday at Stovepipes Wells Village. We talked about our agenda for the weekend. The weather was very nice; not a cloud in the sky. Some of the group were camping, others in the park hotels and others stayed at a hotel outside the park.

We headed over to Mesquite dunes around 4:00PM, it was crowded, so all of us hiked quite a distance to find some dunes that look less disturbed. We climbed up to a great vista on one of the distant dunes and started to make images. We stayed until the sunset, and then hiked back for dinner, and went to bed early.

Saturday was going to be a full day. We all arrived before dawn to photograph the sunrise at Zabriskie Point. What a spatial site. We, and
