

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Notes From Lyle By: Lyle Trusty, MLPA, AS4C

"... you are giving control of depth of field, stopping motion, and sometimes flash and ISO to the camera as it sets each function properly for the activity you have selected."

No matter how many other applications you may have to aid, Photoshop or Lightroom, in processing your images, there are some basic characteristics of cameras one must master in order to produce an image that **can be** optimized. For example**; 1. What do you do with a great landscape image if the depth of field has not been considered and the foreground is out of focus? 2. If a portrait image requires a soft background you must consider depth of field in setting up. 3. Do you know which lens focal length provides the greatest depth of field for a given situation? Fortunately, most consumer level cameras have three levels of control; Auto, Basic, and Advanced.

To start with there is a totally automatic setting for point and shoot. It's selected by rotating the mode selector to <u>AUTO</u>, which is often represented by a green rectangle. This mode takes care of f-stops, shutter speed, white balance, ISO, and turns the flash on or off. You will generally get a good snapshot 90 percent of the time, but remember, you have given up control of depth of field, (hyper-focal range, really), the ability to stop motion, white balance, and usually control of the flash. Those are common technical disqualifications in judging images.

BASIC mode, the one with all the Icons, restores most of your choices. All you have to do is match up the images to the activities; a mountain equals landscapes, a head equals portraits, a skier equals action, a flower equals close-ups or macros, and etc. (The icons vary by manufacturer). With this mode you are giving control of depth of field, stopping motion, and sometimes flash and ISO, to the camera as it sets each function properly for the activity you have selected. Not too bad! It tries very hard to make a good image for you.

ADVANCED modes are found in Prosumer cameras. They are A, S (or T) P, and M and stand for Aperture priority, Shutter priority, Program, and Manual. **Aperture** mode allows you to select the f-stop you want, to give you control of depth of field, (it really gives you control of the hyper-focal range, which varies with the lens focal length). When you set the f-stop in Aperture priority the camera selects the correct shutter speed to achieve a good exposure. It will usually be a slower speed than normal, requiring a tripod be used. **Shutter** priority gives you the ability to stop motion. When you set in a fast shutter speed, the camera will automatically adjust the f-stop to allow more light in to maintain a good exposure. **Program** mode provides an average setting for both f-stop and shutter speed, then allows you to set each of them as you prefer. It will automatically provide a good exposure for any change you make to either one

of them. It will automatically set up a good combination for a flash picture too. <u>Manual</u> mode is for situations requiring a fixed combination of f-stop and shutter speed, independent of automatic control by the camera, such as when you are shooting portraits with strobes as your light source. It gives you direct manual control of exposure for whatever special purpose you have.

**Landscapes are generally shot with a 24 mm wide angle lens set to f-11 or f-16. That lens will let you set the hyper-focal distance from 3 feet to infinity, whereas a longer lens will have a shorter in-focus range. Portraits are usually shot with an 85 to 105 mm lens set to f-4 or f-5.6 to avoid nose or shoulder foreshortening and provide a soft background. At those f-stops the shutter speed would usually be quite fast. However, if using strobes select Manual exposure mode, set the shutter speed to the flash synch speed, 1/100th to 1/250th, and the f-stop as determined by the flash duration, which is quite short, like 1/600th to 1/2000 of a second. You'll need a light meter in this case to determine the proper exposure setting, or gauge it by the graph on the Histogram. (That's for another time and another "Notes from Lyle")

The information provided here does not replace what is in the Fair's on-line Exhibit Guide/Premium Book, but is only intended to add further clarification and help on preparing your prints for the Fair.

We would like to encourage everyone to sign up to volunteer as a clerk or exhibit monitor for the photography exhibit. You can sign up on the <u>LPA AV Fair Signup Page</u>. For information about being an exhibit monitor, check out the <u>AV Fair Monitor Responsibilities</u>.

Premiums have been increased for both Digital and Print entries for this year. Best of Division is now \$50 and Best of Show is now \$100. A Sweepstakes Award of \$100 has been added. We have a new Digital Class – Portraits. We have a new judging system for juniors using the Danish system, where more awards can be offered per class.

How to decide which status you should select; Amateur, Advanced Amateur, or Professional

The definition of "Advanced Amateur" was re-written a few years ago to encourage more people to move up. As you may have noticed, some of the classes in the Amateur divisions had so many entries that your chance of winning in some classes seemed quite small. As the rules state, if you've won more than two Blue Ribbons, you're required to move into the Advanced status. However, even if you haven't won those blue ribbons, it could be to your advantage to move up. You'll be competing with a lot less entries and then there's the prestige of winning in a higher status.

So, it's mostly up to you. If your photography has significantly improved, you should consider entering as an Advanced Amateur.

Note: Whichever status you select must apply to all of your entries in Photography.

Choosing the Classes for your Entries

Your primary decision in choosing which class to enter your photos should be based on the main or dominant theme of the photograph. Many photographs could qualify for more than one class, but your chance of winning is likely to be better if you choose the correct class.

Print Rules

The print rules remain the same as last year, and are quite liberal.

Borders are allowed. This means that the mount-board may be larger than the print, and/or the border may be part of the print.

The maximum size of 16 inches x 20 inches still applies to the mount-board. So, for example, a 12" x 16" print could be

mounted on a 16" x 20" board. Here are some examples of your options.





Matting is not allowed

In most cases, we recommend that prints be "flush mounted", which means that the print is the same size as the mount-board. Borders should be reserved for those prints that you really feel will be enhanced by the border.

We do have limited space to hang everyone's pictures. Too many entries with maximum borders could result in an overcrowded and disorderly looking display and may force us to restrict the option of borders in the future.

Adhesives used to mount your pictures to the mount-boards must be the permanent type.


The PSA Interclub competitions will begin again in October.

The 2012 Photographic Society of America's Youth Photography Showcase judging was held on Friday, May 11th, in Wisconsin. The Youth P S A Photography Showcase is an annual competition for all high school age students. Entries are accepted only through Chapters, PSAmember clubs, and Councils.

There were 403 prints and 270 digital images

entered this year from all over the world. Serving as judges were Sandra Matson, Jeff Klug, and Signe Emmerich. The full day of judging was coordinated by Gerry Emmerich, Jr., FPSA, GMPSA, and under the supervision of Kathleen Z. Braun, APSA, PPSA, PSA Youth Showcase Director. Phyllis Bankier organized the digital section entries, and Kathy Braun, APSA, PPSA, organized the print section entries.

Awards and Honorable Mentions were chosen in each section in each of the five categories (Architecture, People and/ or Animals, Scapes, Photojournalism, and Photographer's Choice or Creative). and grandkids, and actually do some cherry picking.



Downtown Lancaster Walk-About Field Trip

Mono Lake and Bodie Field Trip

September 14-15, 2012 Led by David and Christine Wilkins

The LPA had a field trip to Mono Lake and Bodie three years ago and it was a very popular outing. Many of the images taken on that trip have won awards for several members. Chris and I decided to go again this September and make it a field trip for the LPA. What makes this September date so special is that the weather is cooler by September, the new moon is Friday, the 14th and Saturday, the 15th is photographer's day at Bodie.

I think Mono Lake is a great place to photograph star trails and do a little light painting as well as a great place for sunset/

sunrise. The new moon or no moon night makes a perfect opportunity for night photography. We plan on driving to Lee Vining on Friday the 14th to catch sunset over Mono Lake and then to photograph star trails and light paint the tufa. One can return for sunrise early on Saturday and then head back to Lee Vining for breakfast before spending the rest of the day at Bodie.

The tufa at Mono Lake are accessible via about a ½ mile walk from the parking lot. The last time we were there, there were hoards of photographers for sunrise/sunset but none usually stay after sunset. You may join us for all or part of this trip.

The South Tufa area at Mono Lake is reached by taking highway 120 East from Highway 395. The turnoff to the South Tufa area is marked and is about one mile long. The South Tufa trail leads to the lake edge. There is a \$3 charge for parking.

Sunrise on the 15th of September is at 6:39AM and Sunset on the 14th is at 7:03PM. A star trail shot can start about 8:30PM, as it will be dark enough by then, and be finished by either 9:30PM for a one-hour shot or 10:30PM for a two-hour shot. Chris reminds me that it will be CHILLY at night. She is wearing thermal underwear, Polartec pants, wool sweater, wool hat, gloves with glove liners, 2 sets of socks one of which is wool, and a parka. Dave says that this is overkill!

Those who photograph sunrise at Mono Lake will head back to Lee Vining for breakfast. We'll pick a location as the date gets closer. A picnic lunch would be in order at Bodie and then the afternoon can be spent taking photos there. The park closes at 6PM which is one hour before sunset. We will also pick a location for dinner in Lee Vining for those who are

There are two wavs to reach Bodie from Lee Vining. One is mostly gravel, but shorter and the other only has three miles of The gravel. shorter gravel approach turns off

from 395 about 18 miles North of Lee Vining to highway 270. Bodie is reached after a 10 mile drive over pavement and three miles over a gravel road. Total trip length is 31 miles. The shorter trip, but more gravel road, turns on to highway 167, seven miles North of Lee Vining and then North on road 1671 after 8.8 miles and then to Bodie. Total length of this route is 26 miles from Lee Vining. Park hours are 8AM to 6PM so we will not be able to catch sunset.

The only way to catch sunrise/sunset at Bodie is to sign up for photographer's day, which is the 3rd Saturday of the month. Last time the cost was \$50 per person and the limit was 50 people. This permits one to enter the park 30 minutes before sunrise and stay 30 minutes after sunset. More information will be provided as we get closer to the date.

The Future of Photography

Photography has been changing since the day it was invented. What the future holds for photography was a mystery to me until Scott Roberts, at our March workshop, made a comment about where his profession is today. Scott said that, until the rise of the digital cameras, it was enough to get "good exposure" because that was enough to separate the professionals from the amateurs. With digital cameras anyone can do that. Looking through FLIKR and all those other online photo sites it's easy to see the truth in this. Within just a few minutes of gazing at the billions (yes, billions with a b) of "good" photos available from around the world it's easy to become discouraged and leave the camera on the shelf. After all, who can compete with all those.

Scott also had a solution, you create your own style, your personal trademark. He does this with his own combination of warm, slightly low-key lighting and staging his subjects in his own personal style of thought provoking positions. His images are beautiful, imaginative, and, most of all, unique to him.

For many of us it's enough to take "good" photographs and to be able to say "I did this." For those who want to stand out in the crowd of photographers then we too must create our own style. With all the millions of other photographers we're competing with this may be a challenge, but one well worth accepting. Of all the LPA photographer's photos, look for the ones taken with a fish-eye lens, usually from a low angle, and you'll quickly realize that they're all made by the same photographer. His style is simple, fascinating, yet unique.

Through years of leafing through photo books I've learned that there are some styles that have not been pursued by the masses on FLIKR. For example, Film Noir has a long history and copious historical examples but few recent advocates. Add a little personal style and you've trademarked yourself. Another style I found fascinating, but under-utilized, is the art of splitting the image. For example, the right half may be sharply focused on a stand of trees with the left half a contrasting rocky cliff or water. The list of possibilities is endless.

If you want some inspiration then go to your local library or peruse the magazine racks at the big book stores. Find something that appeals to you, put your own personal twist on it, and you too can become unique among the masses.
